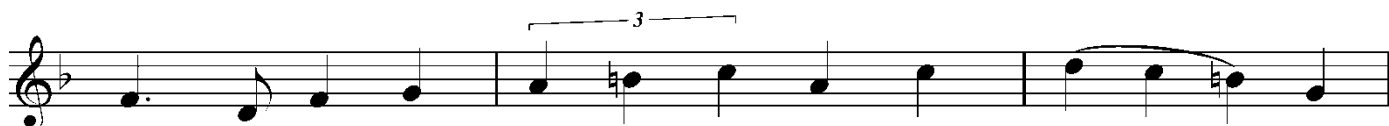

God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God,
begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father;
through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven,

This Litany is drawn from lyrics composed by Katherine Lee Bates and prayers for our national life found on page 838 in the Book of Common Prayer.

Priest: Let us continue standing as we offer our prayers, being particularly mindful this Sunday closest to our nation's celebration of independence of our gratitude for this freedom and the duties it imposes upon us.

People: **For purple mountain majesties above the fruited plain!**

America, America, God shed his grace on thee,

Intercessor: Almighty God, giver of all good things: We thank you for the natural majesty and beauty of this land. They restore us, though we often destroy them.

People: **Heal us.**

Intercessor: We thank you for the great resources of this nation. They make us rich, though we often exploit them.

People: **Forgive us.**

Cantor: O beautiful for heroes proved in liberating strife,

People: **Who more than self their country loved, and mercy more than life!
America, America, God mend thine every flaw,
Confirm thy soul in self-control, thy liberty in law.**

Intercessor: We thank you for the men and women who have made this country strong. They are models for us, though we often fall short of them.

People: **Inspire us.**

Intercessor: We thank you for the torch of liberty which has been lit in this land. It has drawn people from every nation, though we have often hidden from its light.

People: **Enlighten us.**

Cantor: O beautiful for patriot dream that sees beyond the years

Intercessor: We thank you for the faith we have inherited in all its rich variety. It sustains our life, though we have been faithless again and again.

Celebrant: Lift up your hearts.

People: **We lift them to the Lord.**

Celebrant: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

People: **It is right to give God thanks and praise.**

The Celebrant gives thanks for the gifts of God, and the people respond with the hymn,

The people may stand or kneel for the remainder of this prayer. If it is a physical hardship, please be seated.

In the midst of the Great Thanksgiving, the people join in declaring the mystery of faith:

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again...

At the conclusion of the prayer, the people respond,

Amen.

The Lord's Prayer

The Breaking of the Bread *The Celebrant breaks the Consecrated Bread.*

A period of silence is kept. Then the Celebrant and people speak the Fraction Anthem:

Celebrant: Alleluia. Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us;

People: **Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia.**

The Distribution of Gifts

The celebrant then says the following invitation: The Gifts of God for the People of God.

The people come forward to receive Holy Communion. Those on the right side fill in the rail from right to left (back to front). Those on the left side also fill in the rail from right to left (front to back).
